Health Department

I am proud to present the 2013 Annual Report that showcases the activities provided by the Steubenville Health Department Staff, Administration and Board of Health.

Two board members (Dr. Patrick Macedonia and Dr. Paul DiBiase) were re-appointed to an additional five year term on the board of health and Dr. Patrick Macedonia was elected by the members to serve as President Pro-tempore of the health board for the 2013 year. The Board of Health met in regular session eleven (11) times during the year.

In 2013, two Resolutions were adopted by the Board of Health: Resolution 2013-01: A resolution increasing the fee for vital statistics services to twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) effective August 1, 2013 and Resolution 2013-02: Establishing License Fees for the 2014 food licensing period effective January 19, 2014.

Adopting a new fee for vital statistics generated an additional four thousand three hundred and forty-two dollars (\$4,342.00) in the City's General Fund in 2013. The food license fees adopted under Resolution 2013-02 will go into effect for the March 1st, 2014 licensing period.

For the past sixteen years, Councilman David (Pokey) Lalich served as City Council's representative to the Board of Health and he faithfully attended monthly health board meetings. He retired from his council position in November of 2013. The health department staff and board members would like to express our thanks and appreciation for all Councilman Lalich did to help promote public health throughout our health district. We welcome 5th Ward Councilman Willie Paul as the new 2014 Chairman of the Health & Safety Committee of City Council and look forward to working with him, Councilman Robert Villamagna and Councilman-at-large Kenny Davis. Councilman Paul appointed Councilman Villamagna to be his representative to the board of health in his (Councilman Paul's) absence.

Administratively, City Manager Cathy Davison resigned her position in May of 2013 and Mayor Domenick Mucci, who also serves as President of the Board of Health, was appointed Acting City Manager for the remainder of the year. Effective January 6th, 2014 Mr. Tim Boland began his tenure as City Manager. The members of the board of health and staff look forward to working with Mr. Boland to move Steubenville forward by enhancing the quality of life for our residents through service delivery.

The Steubenville Health Department partners with other agencies and departments within the City to protect and promote the public's health. Steubenville health department relies on a regional epidemiologist and a county public health emergency preparedness coordinator to assist with managing public health emergencies. The manner of how these positions can be shared between/among health districts is structured by the Ohio Department of Health's Emergency Preparedness Grant and the partnerships developed years ago continue to be successful and cost-effective. The Steubenville Health Department is part of the Southeast Region of health departments and Mr. John (Jack) McGuire is the preparedness coordinator for the Jefferson County/Steubenville City health districts while Ms. Kristen Baker, housed at Muskingum County Health Department, serves as the regional epidemiologist for a twelve (12) county area that includes the Steubenville Health District.

The health department partners with the Comprehensive Care Center of Youngstown, Ohio to provide HIV/AIDS screening for Jefferson County residents. This service is provided at the Steubenville Health Department and this service is free to the public. A total of twenty-three (23) residents took advantage of this service. Compass Family & Community Services, also out of Youngstown, provides Ryan White services to HIV positive residents who reside throughout Jefferson County.

Case Workers utilize offices at the Steubenville Health Department to provide better accessibility for HIV/AIDS patients residing in the area. Screening services are available on a monthly basis at the Steubenville Health Department. Counseling services are available on an as needed basis.

In 2013, there was a need for the Steubenville Health Department to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding with Columbiana County Health Department to assure coverage for plumbing code enforcement in the absence of either department's Plumbing Inspector. Plumbing Inspector John Shanley conducted a total of two inspections for the Columbiana County health district and dollars were received for this service. This agreement between our two health districts will be on-going to assure continuity for oversight of plumbing codes.

The health department also provides inspection services for the Jefferson County Department of Job & Family Services' Type B Child Daycare Program. In 2013, a total of sixteen (16) providers were enrolled in this program. During the contract period thirty-four (34) inspections were conducted by Ms. Francesca Veltri. Inspections are conducted according to the guidelines set forth by the Ohio Department of Job & Family Services. The contract between our two agencies was first entered into in 1998 and has been renewed each year thereafter. For the 2014 year, the State is implementing changes as to how the program will be managed however the inspection component will remain unchanged.

The 2013 revenue and expenditure reports, vital statistics activity, birth and mortality data can be found on page 2 of this report. Per capita expenditures for 2013 was twenty-nine dollars and thirty cents (\$29.30). The health department's funding sources are shown on pages 2 & 3. Mrs. Tina Burchfield and Mrs. Margaret Kostecki oversee financial transactions for the department.

I am pleased to report that births to unwed teen mothers declined in 2013 from thirty-eight (38) in 2012 to twenty-eight (28) this past year. Unfortunately, of the twenty-eight teen mothers, fifteen of these teens were Steubenville residents; four of the twenty-eight mothers were sixteen years of age, one was seventeen while the remaining were either eighteen or nineteen years old; the majority of these teen moms were Caucasian. Registrar Margaret Kostecki registered a total of five hundred twelve (512) births and six hundred thirty-five (635) deaths during 2013.

In addition to processing a total of five thousand six hundred and forty-six (5,646) vital records and five hundred and seventy-three (573) burial permits, the staff completed eighty-one (81) paternity affidavits from the State, six (6) paternity affidavits filed in this office, and verified eighty-two (82) birth/death records for agencies. A total of two hundred and two (202) corrections were made by the staff in the electronic Helpstar vital statistics statewide system. A total of three hundred and five (305) birth certificates were locally processed for residents whose birth record is housed in another registration district as part of Ohio's statewide birth certificate issuance program thus generating additional dollars locally for the health department. Deputy Registrar Francesca Veltri assists Mrs. Kostecki and Mrs. Burchfield with day-to-day processing of birth and death certificate and burial permit requests.

2013 recorded a total of six hundred thirty-five (635) deaths with the leading causes being heart, cancer and pulmonary disease. Lung cancer was the most prevalent type of cancer death followed by colon and breast cancer. A total of seven (7) homicides, four (4) accidental drug overdoses and four (4) suicides were recorded last year. Ages of the homicide victims ranged from seventeen years to forty; the accidental drug overdose victims' ages ranged from forty-four years to fifty-two and the suicide cases ranged in age from forty years to sixty-two years of age.

An Opiate Task Force was established midway through 2013 as the means to promote public awareness about the dangers of prescription, non-prescription and recreational drug abuse. The Jefferson County Prevention & Recovery Board organized the group that is comprised of a variety of community representatives including public health, law enforcement, the courts, school districts, mental health, job & family services, Family & Children First Council, funeral directors, the news media and emergency response. As health commissioner, I represent the health department on this committee. This committee also adopted a goal to establish a permanent drop-box for residents to be able to dispose of unused drugs safely and securely. A drop-box will be housed in the City's municipal building and should be in place in 2014. Awareness campaigns will be another tool used by this committee to educate school-age children as well as adults.

In an effort to promote healthy lifestyles, as health commissioner I serve on the planning committee for Jefferson County Trails & Greenways. Additionally, a Steubenville sub-committee was formed to develop plans for a walking/biking trail within the City. The City's Community Planner, Engineer, Mayor, a representative from Franciscan University and Health Commissioner are part of this group along with several private citizens. Our goal is to develop a walking/biking trail within the City as a means to motivate residents to engage in healthy activities to improve health and well being. This project is in its infancy and funding sources are being sought.

As health commissioner, I am responsible to conduct an annual inspection of the local ambulance service that provides emergency response and transport for our residents as defined in the codified ordinances of the City of Steubenville. The City enters into a contract with Ambulance Service, Inc. and registers their emergency management technicians, paramedics and advanced paramedics. The current permit is due for renewal on December 31, 2014.

The Ohio Department of Health conducted an annual inspection of Trinity Medical Center's Birthing Unit in January of 2013. As health commissioner, I presided over this inspection. As stipulated under Ohio's Administrative Code (OAC 3701-7-03), the local board of health approves the application of the facility offering maternity and newborn care within the health district. Trinity Health System's application was approved by the board of health on January 17th, 2013.

The Nursing Division is responsible for providing a variety of services for the community. Services include offering immunization clinics to prevent certain diseases, screening for chronic diseases such as tuberculosis and hypertension, monitoring the prevalence of communicable diseases to prevent epidemics from occurring, preventing childhood lead poisoning by receiving reports of elevated blood lead levels of age appropriate children, assisting parents of school-age children after use of a head lice treatment. Workforce development and emergency planning are also part of the nursing staff's responsibility. In addition, the nursing staff fields questions and provides education to individuals seeking information about immunization requirements for school and travel, basic hygiene and a variety of other public health concerns.

The Nursing Division held a total of fifty (50) clinics offering tuberculosis skin testing and blood pressure monitoring for adults. A total of four hundred seventy-three (473) tuberculosis skin tests were administered. Three individuals were identified with a reactive TB test and were referred to Jefferson County TB Clinic for further evaluation.

A total of one hundred seventy-one (171) blood pressures were taken with fifteen (15) new clients seen in 2013 and one hundred fifty-eight (158) individuals returning to the health department for a blood pressure recheck.

Unfortunately, in 2013 one of our regular attendants at our blood pressure clinic passed away. Over the years a friendship was established between Malcolm Irwin, his wife Virginia and the entire staff. Mr. Irwin is sadly missed by each of us, but his memory lives on in his many works of art that he presented to the staff. These pictures hang on the walls in the department for public viewing.

Our immunization program is a successful program noted by the number of adults and children who utilize this service. Registered nurses Teresa Mitts and Tammie Suffoletta conduct services for the programs described. Nursing Director Sandra Perlosky assists with clinic duties on an as needed basis.

A total of ninety-nine (99) immunization clinics were held throughout the year and two hundred sixty-five (265) children were vaccinated. Please review page 6 of this report citing a breakdown of vaccines administered. The adult population continues to utilize the health department for their vaccination needs as well. Our flu clinics were very successful. A total of five hundred and thirty (530) flu shots were given. The nursing division would like to express their thanks and appreciation to Mr. Allen Hall and his staff at the Schiappa Library for allowing the health department use of the conference room as an outreach clinic to administer flu shots to the public. In addition to receiving a flu shot, two hundred seventy-seven (277) adults also obtained other vaccines from the health department. A list of the types of vaccines provided for adults can be found on page 6 & 7.

The nurses also entered a total of three hundred and seven (307) charts into Ohio's statewide Impact SIIS electronic tracking system. Additionally, a total of one hundred fifty (150) immunization records were copied for individuals who requested a copy of their immunization (shot) record.

The health department is an approved provider for immunization services for several insurance companies. As a result, Billing Clerk Francesca Veltri submitted a total of six hundred and thirty (630) claims for payment. Self-payment was received for the remainder of immunization services. The Ohio Department of Health continues to evaluate their pilot "Billables Project". Once the pros & cons of this project are determined, the board of health and nursing staff will determine the feasibility to privately purchase childhood immunizations to vaccinate children covered by health insurance. Currently, the health department functions under the Vaccine for Children (VFC) Immunization Program in conjunction with the Tuscarawas County Health Department's Rural Health Clinic. Children must meet certain criteria to be eligible to receive state-supplied vaccine. The Ohio Department of Health is evaluating whether the VFC program warrants change.

The Ohio Department of Health utilizes an electronic tracking system known as ODRS (Ohio Disease Reporting System). Nursing Director Sandra Perlosky monitors the prevalence of communicable diseases daily. I am pleased to report that Mrs. Perlosky was recognized by the southeast regional epidemiologist for her timely and accurate reporting for the Southeast Region.

A list of communicable diseases reported to the health department in 2013 is found on page 7. With regard to cases of influenza (flu), the State of Ohio requires reporting of only hospitalized cases of flu. Unfortunately, the Steubenville Health Department records one of the highest numbers of cases of Chlamydia, Gonorrhea and Hepatitis C within the southeast region.

The Environmental Division is comprised of the Plumbing Program, Food Service Program, Swimming Pool Program, Animal Control, School/Jail Inspections and Nuisance Complaint investigations. A list of activities for these programs can be found on page 9. 2013 saw the construction of a new motel, a new wellness complex, an apartment complex, a restaurant and remodeling at Franciscan University's field house. Plumbing Inspector John Shanley worked with residents in the Alexander Manor subdivision and achieved compliance with twenty-eight (28) properties that separated downspouts from the city's sanitary sewer system. Mr. Shanley has already given a deadline of May 31, 2014 to another group of property owners who need to disconnect their downspouts from the sewerage system too. The health department works with the Wastewater Department to attain full compliance with EPA's mandate to remove downspouts from the sewerage system. This project is one of the goals outlined in the City's 2020 Action Plan.

The Plumbing Inspector also works with the Water Department by enforcing repair of leaking or broken water service lines. According to the Ordinances of the City of Steubenville, the property owner is responsible to repair/replace the service line. This task is on-going from year to year. Currently, the Plumbing Inspector is monitoring annual testing compliance of two hundred forty-six (246) backflow devices.

Mr. Shanley also provided testing for prospective journeymen and apprentices per the request of the Local Plumbing & Pipefitters Union 495 located out of Cambridge, Ohio. A total of twenty-four (24) individuals participated. Mr. Shanley was also recognized in a news article from the Plumbing Contractors Association of the State of Ohio newsletter for his manner of code enforcement.

A complete list of plumbing activity can be found on page 9.

The Director of Environmental Health Tony Pasquarella monitors ninety-nine (99) food service operations, thirty-nine (39) retail food establishments, three (3) mobile food service operations and nine (9) vending locations. Additionally, in 2013, twenty (20) temporary food service licenses were issued and nineteen (19) inspections were completed. Newly licensed establishments in 2013 were Texas Roadhouse, the Prime Time Center on Lover's Lane, Microtel, and the Hy Hat.

The Director of Environmental Health licensed a total of eleven (11) swimming pools during 2013 and conducted a total of eighteen (18) inspections. The Ohio Department of Health conducted an on-site review of how the health department implements enforcement of Ohio Administrative Code: Section 3701-31: Swimming Pools. This audit of the swimming pool program found our program meets compliance with standards to operate the swimming pool program. The board of health chose not to adopt any fee change to the 2013 swimming pool license fee structure, therefore the rates remained unchanged from 2012.

A total of sixteen animal quarantine orders were issued by Director of Environmental Health Tony Pasquarella during 2013. The majority of the quarantines involved dogs of the pit bull breed. Additionally, fifteen (15) stray animal bites or exposures were also investigated.

As you review the nuisance complaint breakdown, you will note that complaints regarding bedbugs were the most common type of complaint. Nuisance complaint investigations are very time-consuming yet there is no monetary reimbursement to the department for this service. A complete listing of complaints can be found on page 9.

This will be my final report to you because I am retiring my position as health commissioner at the end of March. I would like to personally thank the staff for their loyalty, dedication, professionalism, and determination to strive to enhance the quality of life for the citizens of Steubenville. To the members of the Board of Health, my sincere thanks, appreciation and gratitude for the confidence you've shown to me over the past twenty-six and a half (26½) years.

To the Mayor, City Administration and the members of City Council, thank you for providing me the opportunity and privilege to service the community as a public health official.

In closing, I would like to use Ralph Waldo Emerson's definition of **success** because, to me, it expresses my personal feelings with regard to my years dedicated to public health service: *To laugh often and much, to win respect of intelligent people and the affection of children; to earn the appreciation of honest critics and endure the betrayal of false friends; to appreciate beauty; to find the best in others; to leave the world a bit better, whether by a healthy child, a garden patch, or a redeemed social condition, to know even one life has breathed easier because you have lived. This is to have succeeded.* Hopefully, my service has had a positive impact on the citizens of Steubenville.
