**Messrs. Villamagna, Hahn, Petrella**

**A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING AND DIRECTING THE CITY MANAGER TO MAKE APPLICATION FOR A GRANT FROM THE OHIO PUBLIC WORKS COMMISSION TO BE USED TOWARDS FUNDING THE CITY OF STEUBENVILLE LABELLA AVENUE WATERLINE UPGRADE AND TO EXECUTE CONTRACTS AS REQUIRED.**

Mayor Barilla – “Do we have a motion to accept?”

Mr. Paul – “I have a question. I think just tonight; didn’t we just discuss that there was going to be an additional; is this the same grant that we’re going to apply for and you said that there be an additional a hundred and seventy some thousand dollars that we would need to run water to; is this the; this is the a marina grant; marina project right? The water line? Is that what this is?”

Mr. Villamagna – “Dave just said do you think that’s what it is.”

Mr. Mavromatis – “Is it the marina? Because we do need the \$175,000 whether if we get a grant or we...”

Mr. Paul – “So we go forward with this and even if we do get the grant we just figure out what we’re doing.”

Mr. Mavromatis – “If we get the grant then we don’t have to take our money. You know our existing funds that’s if; as long as there’s no (all inaudible).”

Unknown – “(All inaudible)”

Mr. Villamagna – “No that’s not how I understand it.”

Mr. Mavromatis – “How do you understand it Bob?”

Mr. Villamagna – “If we get this grant we got to come up with a \$175,000.”

Dave Babela – “Right the project is \$282,000.”

Mr. Mavromatis – “Okay.”

Mr. Paul – “Yeah”

Mr. Mavromatis – “Then it’s different. It’s not the; it’s not the hundred thousand dollars that just was given.”

Mr. Paul – “If the hundred thousand dollars and then; someone was going to take 2% of it and we’re going to get \$98,000 and then we got to come up with the additional hundred...”

Unknown – “Seven-seventy five...”

Mr. Paul – “Seventy some thousand dollars. Correct?”

Mr. Mavromatis – “That’s correct.”

Mr. Paul – “And didn’t we just discuss saying that we were going to...”

Mr. Villamagna – “Would that hurt us? I guess that’s the question right? Would that hurt us; would that hurt us to apply for the grant and then turn it down if we can’t come up with the \$175,000?”

Mr. Mavromatis – “According to Mr. Dolak he said yes it would our future grants.”

Mr. Villamagna – “I think that we should maybe...”

Mr. Paul – “Table it?”

Mr. Mavromatis – “I’d table it until next week.”

Mr. Villamagna – “Postpone it (all inaudible).”

Mr. Dressel – “What’s the deadline?”

Mrs. Hahn – “I think we need more specific information.”

Mr. DiLoreto – “We need more information.”

Mr. Paul – “Yeah.”

Mr. Villamagna – “If we can’t come up with the hundred seventy-five there ain’t no sense; I mean unless we can get it and then we turn it down does that hurt us though?”

Mr. Mavromatis – “Mr. Dolak was adamant when we asked that question; would it hurt us? And the answer was yes. Because they have already approved it; awarded it and now it’s our responsibility to bring up the rest.”

Mr. Villamagna – “Then do we want to postpone this or Dave (all inaudible).”

Mr. Mastros – “I think we table it until we get more information from Mr. Dolak.”

Mr. Villamagna – “And that’s okay (all inaudible).”

Mr. Mastros – “Yes. (Inaudible) table.”

Few Unknown – “(All inaudible)”

Chris Petrossi – “Actually you know; I have; (inaudible) aware of regarding (all inaudible because of a chair moving) it’s a \$100,000 grant and ODNR has administrated (inaudible) \$2,000 of that for administrative purposes (inaudible) \$98,000 and it’s my understanding that the application for the Ohio Public Works Commission is to; is for funds in addition to that. This (inaudible) project is about \$270,000 so with the; say \$100,000 (all inaudible).”

Unknown – “(Inaudible) two.”

Chris Petrossi – “172 this application would come off that 172.”

Mr. Mastros – “Do we know how much that is for Chris? This application?”

Chris Petrossi – “Michael said about \$60,000 I believe.”

Few Unknown – “(All inaudible)”

Mr. Mastros – “Or down to 110 roughly.”

Mr. Villamagna – “About 110?”

Mr. Mastros – “(All inaudible)”

Mr. Villamagna – “So we (inaudible). I make a motion that we table this until we get more information.”

Mr. Paul – “Second.”

Mr. Mastros – “I would table it one week. I would say table it for one week.”

Mr. Villamagna – “Until next week?”

Mr. Mastros – “Yes sir.”

Mr. Villamagna made a motion to table Resolution No. 2018-58 for one week; next Tuesday. Second by Mr. Paul. Roll Call. All ayes. So moved motion carried declared Mayor Barilla.

Mrs. Hahn – “I just want to mention something. We’re working on a couple of fun options down at the marina and I would just say if any of you have it on your heart that you really want to help with something the Harmonium Project is hoping to do a Bands on the Barge event late August or early September and they are looking for a barge that’s someone might be willing to let us use; for you to drop anchor just off the marina and the bands would play towards the marina. They thought they had one and then it fell through so I didn’t know if you are connected to any companies that have barges that maybe would be willing to lend one to us for just one day. So that’s one thing that’s in the works and there’s another kayak event that I’m trying to work on so

anyway it's too rough to go into a lot of details. But if anyone really would like to help with a couple of events down at the marina please let me know. Thanks."

## REPORT OF ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICERS

Mr. Mavromatis – "Thank you Mayor. What I'm passing around to Council; Mr. Villamagna had asked several weeks ago about our water trough on Market Street. It was completely overgrown; this is just a few pictures there; the reason I want Council to take a look at this before we even attempt to refurbish this; this has to be looked at. Myself and Bob Baird went out there; there are several cracks as you see through these pictures here; there's a lot of other work that needs to be done there and again I tried to get verification this is defective item on historical; all these things have to be looked at. I've been playing phone tag with Mr. Gerber but we will be in contact. Mr. Gerber is an individual that lives here in the City; has offered his time with other people to try to get it repainted or we white wash this but it's got to be done right of way."

Mr. Villamagna – "Have you been able to contact him?"

Mr. Mavromatis – "I left a message for him."

Mr. Villamagna – "He's in the hospital. He was involved in a bad wreck."

Mr. Mavromatis – "(All inaudible) I didn't know that."

Mr. Villamagna – "I think he just got out."

Mr. Mavromatis – "Okay I left him with my personal cell Bob so he can reach me. I didn't know that so."

Mr. Villamagna – "I didn't either I just found out."

Mr. Mavromatis – "Well again I wanted Council to see these pictures. I've personally been up there; Mr. Baird has been up there; we had other issues to in the valley there with the tree growth some of those trees need to be cut down but you got to show a proper visual. Again the other thing to be aware of; most of your vehicle traffic is going 35 mph. There is no access in there because it's fenced off at the east part of the Market Street area so I just wanted Council to get a firsthand look at this without having to go up there. Bob you guys did a remarkable job from what it was before but there's still a lot of work we have to do here before we can even contemplate this and I'd like an engineer to look at this because it's (all inaudible)."

Mr. Dressel – "Well many of you know I've been in (inaudible) for 30 some years and I worked with Chris for a long time on the Landmarks Commission but the obvious thing is it needs to be repointed which is the replacing of all the mortar. If it was really built in; assuming it's stone it really shouldn't be painted; if those are cast concrete pieces then maybe but painting it is just the wrong thing to do because that can actually cause the stone to be delaminate; you don't want that to happen. If it is concrete and it was really built in 1910 then it was built after Portland cement existed so you can use typical mortar that's available today. If that date means something other than when it was actually built then you going to have to have mortar analysis done and make sure it's; you're not using mortar that's too hard. So clearly; from; it's not very tall; reappointing it would stabilize everything it's not complicated there's all kinds of people qualified to do that including me so not that I want to do it. Well it's like grouting tile it's not any fun but it's not that hard to do. When you get to the point honestly I'd actually like to go look at it or maybe we should have somebody come up from the Ohio Preservation office and actually go physically look at it before somebody puts something on it that would actually cause more damage than what's intend; that's not what's intended I do get all that; clearly just repointing it though and keeping the vines off of it would make a huge difference. Just from looking at the pictures I mean I was up there once but it's been so long that I just don't remember what it looks like."

Mr. Villamagna – "(Inaudible) checked into this years ago and it cannot be painted."

Mr. Dressel – "Yeah that's what I was thinking."

Mr. Villamagna – "It can have something put on it."

Mr. Dressel – "Yeah you can seal it; there's a seal (all inaudible)."

Mr. Villamagna – "But it cannot be; it cannot be painted."

Mr. Dressel – "It looks cast to me which leads me to believe it's not stone; but I would have to go look closer one of these actually does look like marble so (all inaudible)."

Mr. Villamagna – "One thing I know about (inaudible) brothers..."

Mr. Dressel – "It's not stone. It is cast concrete okay. If it is cast concrete and its 2000 and; 1910 concrete then yes it can be easily repointed without a problem."

Mr. Mavromatis – "What I would ask when you have the time call Mr. Baird."

Mr. Dressel – "Okay."

Mr. Mavromatis – "They have the keys to the gates. They'll get you in there to drive up there and take a look at it and the; I'll check on some other things here and make sure. Now correct me if I'm wrong Bob is there a power box up there? Do we have electricity somewhere?"

Bob Baird – "There is. What you saw inside that cage is our patrol center for our Washington Street lighting."

Mr. Mavromatis – "Okay."

Bob Baird – "It's all down (all inaudible) and up further towards Lawson Ave. Bridge."

Mr. Mavromatis – "Okay."

Bob Baird – "Between PH and LaBelle. That's all through for the Washington Street (all inaudible)."

Mr. Mavromatis – "So we have power there we could tap into?"

Bob Baird – "We have some."

Mr. Mavromatis – "Okay."

Bob Baird – “After there was changes made when there was work done up there that whole center was redone.”  
Mr. Mavromatis – “Okay”  
Bob Baird – “So I don’t know how much extra available power is in there. There’s I’m sure probably we can get single 110 if you’re talking for...”  
Mr. Mavromatis – “Well (inaudible)...”  
Bob Baird – “(All inaudible) something you can probably...”  
Mr. Mavromatis – “Well with today’s technology too we might look at getting a; the portable lights out there that come on a generator.”  
Unknown – “(All inaudible)”  
Mr. Mavromatis – “No just at night it sits; what’s the word I’m looking for?”  
Mr. Paul – “Solar”  
Mr. Mavromatis – “Solar power. Play this up the best we can; we have to cut a couple of the trees down that at night time the solar lights would shine on that give it a nice view there. That’s about the best you’re going to get (inaudible) unless we get it checked. Bob?”  
Mr. Villamagna – “Chris; Scott mentioned that Ohio Preservation is there (all inaudible) or does it have to be some kind of historical (inaudible). Familiar with this kind of stuff or are you familiar with anybody that would be familiar with this kind of stuff?”  
Chris Petrossi – “Yes the Ohio Eastern Preservation office in Columbus.”  
Mr. Villamagna – “Do you have contacts for them?”  
Chris Petrossi – “I do. I can try and see if they’ll send someone here locally.”  
Mr. Villamagna – “Could you reach out to them?”  
Chris Petrossi – “Yeah I can.”  
Mr. Mavromatis – “Yep absolutely. Okay. Mayor that’s all I had tonight.”  
Mr. Mastros – No Report

### MISCELLANEOUS REPORTS

Mr. Timmons – “A few things. Jim 824 Oxford on 4-24 I sent an e-mail about the orange barrel that’s been in front of that location for over a year. I was told 2 months we would get it fixed it’s now exactly 3 months today. So I just wondered where we’re at with that (inaudible) think.”  
Mr. Mavromatis – “Well it’s one of a 130 assignments that have to be fixed and it’s based on priority and health and safety and that’s where it’s at so; our guys are going on water breaks all the time; I get calls about different places and again they’re all priority.”  
Mr. Timmons – “Now I do want to bring that up then. For the past several weeks when I look at the list of weekly report by department; it says the same thing every week for water/wastewater department continuing to work on EPA directives that’s it. I mean is there something that we can get broken down a little bit better than that?”  
Mr. Mavromatis – “Yes you can.”  
Mr. Timmons – “So I would like to see that because I have to tell you know the citizens; this has been in front of his house for so long; I’d be upset too. A car on Oregon; 1908 Oregon out in front I sent an e-mail about that and I see where it’s been written on the car but it’s still there so I just drove by that. If that would be towed I’d appreciate it. Did you find anything about Walgreens? The grass? They cutting their grass behind the...”  
Mr. Mavromatis – “That was given to the code enforcement to notify them it’s their property.”  
Mr. Timmons – “I just hadn’t heard anything so I was... and did anybody call Lisa back? The number I sent in an e-mail yesterday she had left a message with sanitation Saturday she had an issue on Union Ave.”  
Bob Baird – “To my knowledge I know that I have not spoken with her but we were there today and we took the garbage.”  
Mr. Timmons – “Okay so she’s able to put in her garbage since somebody had put in it.”  
Bob Baird – “When I was there today there’s was a; I got the pictures; her can was inside the fenced area of her yard; I assume it was her can.”  
Mr. Timmons – “Okay.”  
Bob Baird – “Another can two houses down that was not the picture that was sent. The bags that were in the picture were there; we took them; we inspected the bags to see if we might determine who they belong too and who might put them there.”  
Mr. Timmons – “She did the same.”  
Bob Baird – “And from what; we were not able to determine...”  
Mr. Timmons and Bob Baird – “(All inaudible)”  
Bob Baird – “What we saw it looks like; we can’t be sure but it looks like someone may of tried to do some clean up; maybe out of the park or laying around...”  
Mr. Timmons – “She thinks they’re having some kind of thing during the day. (Inaudible) contact them; somebody is having something at the park with food but they’re using that; her container for some reason.”  
Bob Baird – “I would not doubt that because that supports what we saw up there today.”  
Mr. Timmons – “And that’s making it so she can’t put her garbage in they have to put it outside then they aren’t picking that up so it’s becoming a problem and that’s why she just didn’t want...”  
Bob Baird – “We took care of everything that was found out there today.”

Mr. Timmons – “And I just want to talk about the water. You know in a couple weeks we’re going to go out to these town halls; I know there has to be a rate increase but after I saw (all inaudible) last week and just thinking (inaudible); I think it’s too much all at once. I mean basically and I’m just one person speaking but it’s going to be tough to defend it you know when I don’t believe in we should be increasing it that much all at one time so; I don’t know what everybody else thinks about it but yeah I think it has to be a lower percent in which make it a longer period of time. I realize they have to go up but not that much so that’s just my feelings on it.”

Mrs. Hahn – “And I also want to just voice a concern about this. After the meeting or maybe concern isn’t the right word but I feel like we have still not looked into the grant options enough to be having that (inaudible) factor. For instance after our meeting last week Tom Hartwig from Arcadis came up to me and said you budgeted a million dollars for a backup generator for the water/sewer plant; the sewer treatment plant and he said the federal government is providing 100% grants for safety related and really; equipment upgrade concern and he said if your plant stopped working and you had no backup generator that would be that kind of circumstance. He couldn’t guarantee it but we have not explored it so to already be factoring in money that’s going to cover an expense that might even be covered 100% seems premature to me. The 50 plus grant writers from HDR did not come in I had asked Chuck if he would please bring them in; talk with us; it was very helpful to have Arcadis talk to us but our sewer treatment projects are being managed by HDR and they’re the ones that was one of the buses was they said they had 50 people who do grant writing for sewer projects all the time so I think that we need to hear from them; we need to find out when we raise the question; okay if the Ohio EPA could also do a similar; we request seven million dollars and possible half forgiven and zero percent interest but it’s due by the end of August. What I asked the question last week where are we on that? We don’t want to miss that opportunity it seemed like a fuzzy answer like well were thinking about it. So I think for us in good conscience to come before the people of the City and say these are the increases that are required; we really need more information and I know that we’re tired of all the meetings but I think; I think we’re still missing some key pieces here to be able to really say yes you have to pay this much more for something that is you know just very essential so I’m not talking about kicking the can down the road; I am committed to following through on this but I share those concerns. I think we need; (inaudible) ready to be saying to people...”

Mayor Barilla – “Mr. Villamagna”

Mr. Villamagna – “Mayor just to reiterate the same feeling as my colleagues. I think the rate is a little bit too much of a burden to put on most of the; well all of the population but certain areas of the population. I don’t think we have all the answers that we need and I’m not; I don’t want to kick the can down the road; I’m prepared to raise them but I’m not prepared to raise them that much until; I think we need more meetings now. We brought our concerns before we have the public meetings because it’s going to be brutal anyways and we’re going to get questions so maybe we should have; I don’t know whether we should have more meetings before or after or what but that being said that’s my opinion. I think it’s a little bit too much and the other thing I wanted to (all inaudible) Eric brought up about these; this report from wastewater. I’d like to go even a step further could we maybe have him put down the water breaks? Where the breaks that we have because every time; Chuck’s always saying we have water breaks, water breaks, water breaks; that way we can have a better idea how many they’re actually are; that would answer a lot of the questions so thank you.”

Mr. Dressel – “Yeah just to add to some of this. I think the one thing that we should ask is that the August deadline on the wastewater side was to just get your idea before them so that; I forget what they called it; it’s like a preliminary application not an actual application we should do that. If it in fact because he keeps specifically said if you decide you’re not going to do it for another year you can just re-up that whatever it was called I’m forgetting the word at the moment was peculiar. We should do that so can we do that? Because we’re potentially losing a lot and then the second thing I was; is you know we haven’t approved anything yet so as of right now the rate increase is zero. So one thing we could do is increase; you know come up with an amount and say fine here’s what you’re doing now; your job is to go out and find grants for the other half whatever percentage that may be; cause there is money out there. We have two; Arcadis and HDR both have grant writing capability you know and we’re paying them both relatively a good amount of money. What’s you know; let them come up with some ideas for us before we just you know drown everybody in expense that’s my opinion about it and I know that all the people that I rent to would probably certainly appreciate you know water not going up astronomically high right away.”

## PUBLIC FORUM

Mayor Barilla – “We’ll now move onto Public Forum this evening and signing in this evening is Mr. Mascio. Mr. Mascio if you’ll please come forward and state your name and address.”

John Mascio – “567 Braybarton. I was reading in the paper; well first I want to thank the City for fixing the pot holes on Johnson Road. I think they were there a couple days after I brought it up last week.”

Mr. Mavromatis – “They were there that morning and I know it was on the list to do (all inaudible because Mr. Mascio interrupted).”

John Mascio – “(All inaudible) done; it was done.”

Mr. Mavromatis – “It was done.”

John Mascio – “In the paper on; I wasn’t here to hear the report that Bob Baird gave about because he brought up if I recall correctly about why the sanitation people aren’t being used in the M & R work and differently things like that and I think his response was they were needed for maintenance on the trucks and repairs on the trucks

and things like that. My question is what did we do when we were on the five day a week schedule because when Mr. Villamagna introduce an ordinance to go to that four day week and it was put into effect; I don't recall anybody standing up and say well we can't do it because and now all of a sudden it seems (inaudible) probably using these men apparently for other things. So why aren't we (inaudible) all of the men on that 5<sup>th</sup> day for M & R or recreation or whatever we need them for?"

Mr. DiLoreto – "Took care of it last week."

Bob Baird – "That is one of the points that we made. I mentioned last week that (all inaudible) we do have an employee doing that work. It is true we did have a little extra time on Thursdays and Fridays prior to going to a 4 day schedule but we were able to do that. Now with the 4 day schedule we don't have time to do that so it still needs done so we do have an employee (all inaudible because someone's cell phone was going off) taken care of. The main thing we talked about last week that was not the main point that was one of the things that was mentioned but the main point we talked about last week is that we have commercial dumpster service out there that we have to serve 5 days a week. So prior to the change we picked up dumpsters 5 days a week and after the change we still have to pick up dumpsters 5 days a week. So we still have a crew out there; we have a couple men on a truck and at the end of the conversation last week; you know some questions from the Mayor; we have; we do have some employees; not every employee but there are some employees in the sanitation department that we do make available or have been made available on Fridays; it's not every single employee; there's still work we have to do within the contexts of collecting garbage but there are some and that varies based on circumstances and schedules and weeks and holidays so that number as we discussed last week; that number varies but we do have some that we had made available through that process."

John Mascio – "Do you know how many?"

Bob Baird – "Again..."

John Mascio – "I think there's 12 in sanitation so do you have any idea how many are out? (All inaudible) doing the work?"

Bob Baird – "The maximum that we've achieved would be 5 and that; some days it's 5 some days it's 3 some days it's 1 but we kind of went through that last week. One of the weeks we had a holiday so we're picking up garbage on Friday..."

John Mascio – "(All inaudible) I understand all that."

Bob Baird – "That's one thing. We have other; we had guys who (all inaudible) street; we were doing work at the water trough and the marina and so forth. This past Friday to be perfectly honest with you we had a fairly high level of absenteeism. So those things all (inaudible from Yonk coughing) impact how many people are available on any given Friday to go out and do it; best case scenario 5 bodies."

John Mascio – "Okay thank you. Second this is probably the last time I'm going to ever bring it up because I've brought it up so many times before. Do you plan on crack sealing the major streets I've been talking about; Sunset, Mall Drive, John Scott Highway and if so when? If you don't plan on doing it why are you not going to do it?"

Bob Baird – "We do plan on doing it. I had provided the City Manager a list of the streets that were done over the last couple of years."

John Mascio – "I'm just talking those; those main streets that I named."

Bob Baird – "Yep and we're coming near that season. Over the last couple of years most of that work has been done August, September, October when we've had a chance to kind of catch up; when the grass slows down; majority of the pot holes are under control and we kind of are able to have more time available that's when we've been doing it. So we do have plans to go crack seal this year..."

John Mascio – "Those streets?"

Bob Baird – "We will accomplish as much as we can accomplish yes. That is our plan."

John Mascio – "My concern is (all inaudible because of noise). We received hundreds of thousands of dollars from the State and Federal Government to do these streets that might not come anytime soon again. If we can do it we should bust our rear ends and go ahead and try to do it to maintain those streets as long as we possibly can and go from there that's my point. Okay thank you."

Mr. Villamagna – "Quick follow up to what Judge Mascio said; Mr. Mascio said. Bob maybe; could we; when you; when Tina does this report here where it says cutting and clear old Market Street water trough; could we put down how many; how many men were available for Friday work?"

Bob Baird – "Yep."

Mr. Villamagna – "You know what I mean?"

Bob Baird – "Sure"

Mr. Villamagna – "Outside of the sanitation schedule."

Bob Baird – "Sure"

Mr. Villamagna – "Okay you know that way we get a more clearer understanding."

Bob Baird – "So that I'm clear. Are you; are you mainly looking at Fridays with those extra bodies or do you want to see of that across the board?"

Mr. Villamagna – "No just Friday. How many guys from sanitation? I was able (inaudible)."

Bob Baird – "Okay so you can see what's going on?"

Mr. Villamagna – "On Friday I was able to put 4 men out to do other duties besides sanitation."

Bob Baird – "Absolutely."

Mr. Villamagna – "On Fridays only."

Bob Baird – "Yeah we can do that."

Mr. Villamagna – "Okay thank you."

Mr. Timmons – "I have one more thing."

Mayor Barilla – “Mr. Timmons”

Mr. Timmons – “Just another crack sealing; I know we want to look at the major streets first but there; when I was (inaudible) around (all inaudible) I was over by (all inaudible not sure what he’s saying) the addition over there; is there any way you can just look and see if there’s something we can do they have some definite issues over there with the roads; to see if there’s some pot holes that need filled or (inaudible) things like that.”

Bob Baird – “Yeah.”

Mr. Timmons – “I’d appreciate that.”

Bob Baird – “As I’m sure you saw that area now in (inaudible) has a combination; there’s paved and unpaved streets there.”

Mr. Timmons – “Yes I understand but whatever you can do they would appreciate; you know they feel kind of left out sometimes because they are all the way over there so.”

Bob Baird – “(Inaudible)”

Mr. Timmons – “I’d appreciate that very much.”

Mr. Paul moved to adjourn. Second by Mr. Villamagna. Roll call. All ayes. So moved; meeting adjourned declared Mayor Barilla.
